Kathleen Shannon Dorcy Receives 2022 Mentorship Award

ONS member Kathleen Shannon Dorcy, PhD, RN, FAAN, helped many of her students grow into expert oncology clinicians, leaders, and educators during her career spanning more than 30 years. In recognition of her generous contributions to the oncology profession, the Oncology Nursing Foundation named Shannon Dorcy the recipient of the 2022 Connie Henke Yarbro Excellence in Cancer Nursing Mentorship Award.

Kathleen is a nurse scientist and the director of research, scholarships, and program development at the Fred Hutchinson Cancer Center in Seattle, WA. She began her career at the very

same research center, working in pediatric bone marrow transplantation, before moving into clinical research and coordinating early-phase monoclonal antibody studies. Earning her master's degree from the University of Washington

she began teaching and inspiring students in the School of Nursing at the University of Washington Tacoma in 1991. In 2017, she took her love of teaching abroad and worked with clinical oncology teams in Kampala, Uganda, to build an oncology curriculum for nurses at the Uganda Cancer Institute. Kathleen was also inducted into the National Academy of Nursing in the same year.

When receiving the award, she thanked the colleagues who nominated her, including Terry McDonnell, DNP, ACNP-BC, and mentor Kathleen Mooney, RN, PhD, FAAN.

This year, the Oncology Nursing Foundation awarded 89 academic scholarships totaling \$516,000 for oncology nurses pursuing bachelor's, master's, and doctoral degrees.



Investments in Oncology Nursing Research: Addressing Cancer Health Disparities



Orally administered cancer treatments have become increasingly common in recent years because of their convenience and efficacy. Many patients choose oral therapies because they prefer being able to take their treatment at home, rather investing time and travel to go to a facility, but

adherence can be a significant problem that has different implications for patients and their treatment outcomes.

Karen E. Wickersham, PhD, RN, is leading a team of interprofessional researchers at the University of South Carolina College of Nursing in Columbia to examine health disparities in the use of oral targeted therapies for the treatment of lung, colorectal, and breast cancers among adults living in South Carolina. The team's work adds to the body of prior research of interventions targeting individual patient-level factors by focusing on the influence of system-level factors such as insurance and payer-provider issues on oral adherence.

This study is supported by the Oncology Nursing Foundation, made possible by a contribution from Genentech, a member of the Roche Group.

We are so grateful to have received a research grant through the Oncology Nursing Foundation. The grant has provided us with the resources to examine disparities in oral targeted therapy utilization and adherence. This information is critical for the development of future multilevel interventions, aimed at ensuring patients with cancer not only receive the most innovative treatments available, but also continue treatment while the therapy benefits them.

The disparities in outcomes for Black men are well documented and must be addressed: for example, literature has shown the differences in how and when Black men receive androgen deprivation therapy compared to White men.

With that understanding, Sally Maliski, PhD, RN, FAAN, and her team at the University of

Kansas Medical Center Research Institute in Fairway are developing and testing interventions to improve the health and well-being of Black men with prostate cancer.

Maliski and her team received an Oncology Nursing Foundation grant to help them gain a better understanding of the differences in care between Black and White men and the effect on disparate outcomes for Black men. Thanks to the grant, the team is conducting additional analyses to identify differences based on age, adjuvant or neoadjuvant use with radiation, or metastatic disease.

Nursing Foundation has been invaluable in providing the support we needed to start our work on more deeply assessing and developing approaches to ameliorate disparities in Black men's receipt of androgen deprivation therapy.

Your IRA Gifts Are Tax Free

Make a difference today and save on taxes—it's possible when you support the Oncology Nursing Foundation through your IRA.

If you are aged 70.5 or older, you can give any amount up to a maximum of \$100,000 per person, per year from your IRA directly to a qualified charity—such as the Oncology Nursing Foundation—without paying income taxes on your withdrawal for the donation. Gifts of any value \$100,000 or less are eligible for the benefit.



Feel good knowing that you are making a difference through the Oncology Nursing Foundation. This popular gift option is commonly called an IRA charitable rollover, but you may also see it referred to as a qualified charitable distribution or QCD for short.

To qualify as tax free, the funds must be transferred directly to the Foundation. If you have check-writing privileges on your IRA, you may mail your check to the Foundation at 125 Enterprise Drive, Pittsburgh, PA, 15275.



Why Should You Consider Giving This Way?

- Your gift will be used today, allowing you to see the difference that your donation is making.
- Beginning the year you turn 72, you can use your gift to satisfy all or part of your required minimum distribution.
- The gift doesn't count as income; therefore, you pay no income taxes on the gift. The transfer does not generate taxable income nor a tax deduction, so you benefit even if you do not itemize your deductions.
