Could you tell us a bit about your1. background and your connection to the field of oncology nursing?

When oncology was a new, burgeoning specialty within the practice of medicine, I was working on an inpatient internal medicine unit. The hospital administration chose my unit to be officially converted to the oncology unit. I jumped in with both feet and never looked back. The things that I loved and kept me engaged were the long-term relationships with my patients and their families, the ever improving and rapidly developing science, the ability to impact outcomes through clinical trials and the constant change and challenge.

The first half of my career was spent in traditional roles, in the later half, I held more nontraditional roles outside of the hospital and within pharma. There I provided education on new treatment options and worked on clinical trials, publications, and presentations.

"The one constant throughout my almost 40 years in oncology has been the Oncology Nursing Society. ONS has provided me with information, professional growth opportunities, experience, exposure to nursing thought leaders, and lifelong friendships with many other oncology colleagues."

The ONS Enterprise has supported me throughout my career. I now hope to be able to support ONS Enterprise and the Oncology Nursing Foundation in having the same impact on the current and next generation of oncology nurses.

As the Foundation Board of Trustees President, what are your primary goals and vision for the Foundation during your tenure?

My goals for myself and the Foundation are simple yet lofty! I want to do everything possible to support current and future oncology nurses. As a profession, we see the challenges that securing funding brings. Funding of all kinds. Nurse researchers have seen research dollars drying up. The Foundation responded by increasing the research grant funding in dollar amounts. The much-needed research will help us all better care for our patients.

Members of the Society report that employers are scaling back on people attending ONS Congress[®]; the Foundation has increased our support of ONS Congress scholarships. The learning, connectedness and inspiration found there is invaluable. I wish more people could attend!

Obtaining academic degrees (bachelor's, master's, and doctoral degrees) is a grueling process while working and attending school. Meeting financial obligations can be a barrier. The Foundation has been and continues to be committed to awarding scholarships to help ease the financial burdens of course work.

One of the critical goals the Foundation, along with the entire ONS Enterprise, tries to address is the development of future leaders. As we envision what the ONS Enterprise looks like for the next generation of oncology nurses, we know what we will need are well-prepared leaders to shape that vision into reality.

How has your first year gone?

3. What are your visions for the future and the 50th anniversary?

The first year of my serving as President of the Foundation has flown by. Over the last year we have grown the Board in size, with a focus on ensuring diverse representation, and in anticipation of things to come. The next few years will be busy ones, as we prepare to celebrate the 50th anniversary of ONS and memorialize the accomplishments of oncology nursing over the last five decades. The first of two goals is raising funds for the development of the Oncology Nursing History Center that preserves our journey thus far.

The Foundation has a second prong to the major campaign underway. Our goal is to raise funds to support oncology nursing activities into the future. The Foundation wants to remain nimble and impactful in our support of oncology nursing research, education, and leadership development. To accomplish this goal, it is imperative that we grow the impact fund of the Foundation. I often tell people my main goal is to raise money, then give it away! The more money we can raise, the more we can give back to oncology nurses.

The Foundation plays a pivotal role in supporting oncology nursing. In your
opinion, what are the key areas where the Foundationcan make the most significant impact?

When I joined the Foundation Board, I was a seasoned leader. I had held several leadership roles within the ONS Enterprise, yet I discovered I knew very little about the Foundation, how it worked, and all the great work that it did and does. In my opinion the Foundation is the best kept secret in the ONS Enterprise. The Foundation Board is committed to spreading the word about all the funding available to oncology nurses in conjunction with raising the donations needed to ensure success well beyond the 50th anniversary of ONS.

Everyone I know or meet has been affected by cancer. Almost universally they are so very grateful for the care that "their" nurses have given them. The nurses took care of their needs, physically, emotionally, and educationally. Why is it that they don't think about donating to the Foundation in honor of "their" nurses? Do the general public and patients and their families know of the opportunities the Foundation provides and that we are a 501(c)(3) organization? Do they know their donations are tax deductible? They often do not know of the opportunities and support offered by the Foundation. It is the goal of the Foundation Board to change that paradigm.

As a leader in the field, what strategies do you believe will

5. effectively engage the community of oncology nurses and encourage their active participation in the Foundation's programs and initiatives?

The Board and I are committed to communicating with as many people as possible. We are reaching out to individuals, chapters, healthcare organizations, philanthropies, and patients and families. We will meet in person, on the phone, and over video call. Any mode available to us, we will try to make it happen.

Yes! I would be remiss if I did not call out the awesome staff who work day in and day out to make the Foundation a success. Angie Stengel leads the team as the Executive Director. 2024 Mara Mogensen Flaherty Memorial Lecture: Voice of Resilience

Bill Brummel, an award-winning documentary producer and 27-year cancer survivor will deliver the 2024 Mara Mogensen Flaherty Memorial Lecture at the 49th Annual ONS Congress[®]. Brummel is known for his impactful work, having been recognized with a Peabody Award, a primetime Emmy nomination, several National News and Documentary Emmy nominations, and two International Documentary Association awards.

The lecture will draw on his personal experiences and his documentary Can You Hear My Voice?. The film highlights the Shout at Cancer choir, composed of individuals who, like Brummel, lost their voice boxes to cancer. Through film clips and personal narratives, Brummel will explore themes of identity, resilience, and the transformative journey of survivorship. This lecture promises to be an enlightening and emotional experience, underscoring the strength and spirit of those affected by cancer.

Presented by the Oncology Nursing Foundation and supported in part by Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center. The Mara Mogensen Flaherty Memorial Lecture Award supports an annual lecture on a topic related to the psychosocial aspects of cancer diagnosis, treatment, and care, presented by an individual who is an inspiration in the field. The first lecture was delivered in 1982 and was the first program initiative of the newly established Foundation. Its namesake was a young woman, Mara, who was diagnosed with Ewing's sarcoma at the age of 19. She was told she did not have long to live, but her passion for education and survivorship advocacy sustained her for another 14 years. She managed the National Cancer Institute's Coping with Cancer program, where her work on the project and her own.

Advancing Oncology Care Through Research

The Oncology Nursing Foundation in 2023 awarded key research grants, marking a continued effort to drive forward the field of oncology nursing.

Claire Han, PhD, DNP, RN, ARNP from the Ohio State University, College of Nursing was awarded a \$50,000 grant for her study which investigates the gastrointestinal toxicity in patients with colon cancer. This study focuses on how chemotherapy affects the fecal microbiome, a key factor in gastrointestinal health, and its broader implications on patient well-being.

Sumin Park, PhD, RN, from the University of Utah, was also recognized for her research with a \$50,000 grant. Her study examines the influence of social determinants of health on patients with lung cancer and their caregivers during the post-treatment phase. By exploring these social factors, her work aims to improve overall health outcomes in this critical recovery period.



"A research grant from the Oncology Nursing Foundation will help me meet my academic and professional goals by allowing me to complete this research to support the development of innovative strategies in acute and long-term GI symptom toxicity prevention and management in colorectal cancer patients receiving chemotherapy. I am especially privileged to work alongside a team of dedicated oncology professionals and researchers at the Ohio State University Comprehensive Cancer Center-James and College of Nursing for this research to ensure we design solutions to improve CRC survivors' outcomes and quality of life."

"As an early-stage investigator, receiving a research grant (REO3) from the Oncology Nursing Foundation will serve as a catalyst for the next stage of my career. The grant will enable me to achieve two primary objectives: firstly, to gain insights and knowledge into the impact of social determinants of health on the health-related outcomes of patients with cancer and their family caregivers, considering multi-level perspectives; and secondly, to identify potential areas for future interventions that take into account the role of social determinants of health."
